LEGAL ASPECTS OF AGRICULTURE -- AGB 314 Summer 2014

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Textbook: McEowen & Harl, Principles of Agricultural Law

Supplemental reading materials may be provided throughout the course.

<u>Description</u>: A study of the legal framework impinging upon decision-making of farm business including contracts, real property, civil liabilities, secured transactions, negotiable instruments, business organization, and regulations of land and water use.

Each week, the student will have a reading assignment, an accompanying PowerPoint to review, participation through weekly discussions and quiz over that week's material. There will be two tests and a final that will allow the student to demonstrate mastery over the course material.

<u>Purpose Statement</u>: The purpose of this course is not to make every student into a lawyer, but to provide a practical understanding of legal principles that affect agriculture that you may need to be familiar with in the course of your career. In short, I want you to be able to know when you may be facing a legal issue that may require you to consult legal counsel in order to properly handle a given situation.

Each week you will be responsible for a quiz over the reading material. This quiz will be timed and once started, must be completed in one sitting.
